2. Reported wildlife sightings at the Reserve during November

a. Birds:

3. Construction and Maintenance Work during November

Sat. 02 Ian Donaldson cleared the ditch along the east side of the Eskrigg Farm road between the conduit under the road near the end of the Quaas Loaning up to the conduit under the road just before the car park entrance.

Tue. 05 M & W Tarmacadam Contractors Ltd resurfaced the Eskrigg Farm road. First, they scraped the turf off the middle of the road and along the west edge (1). They then brought the tar-planer (2) and the Roller (3) down to the car park. The planer was moved out onto the start of the road and a lorry from Grange Quarry backed up to the planer and filled the hopper with gravel – type 1 sub-base (4). The lorry then moved forward



several metres and the planer then gradually moved forwards and deposited a layer of gravel of the required depth (5). When the hopper was nearly empty the lorry backed up to the planer and refilled the hopper (6). Meanwhile the roller was being used to firm up the gravel that had been laid (7). This procedure was repeated for the length of the road, except for a few stretches where concrete had been previously laid. Once the whole road had been given its new "coat" the roller went back and forth along the road multiple times to compact the gravel and leave a firm surface that we hope will last for several years (8). The "Tarmac Team" did a great job.
